### 4. First Aid

### **EMERGENCY OVERVIEW**

DANGER. Extremely flammable. Contents under pressure. Keep away from heat and flame.

## 5. Fire Fighting Measures

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### Suitable fire extinguishing media:

#### Specific hazards arising from the chemical:

Flammable aerosol. In a fire or if heated, a pressure increase will occur and the container may burst, with the risk of subsequent explosion. Gas may accumulate in low or confined areas or travel a considerable distance to a source of ignition and flash back, causing fire or explosion.
